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Course Overview

Tenth Grade Health (Driver Education) is designed to teach the students all they need to know to become safe, responsible drivers. Students will learn how to progress through New Jersey's Graduated Driver's License program, and will receive an opportunity to take the NJ State Permit Test. They will learn how to fulfill the various Motor Vehicle Commission requirements for their vehicles. Students will become familiar with the meanings of various traffic control devices and will be able to describe how to negotiate road sites where these devices are present. The students will learn basic car maneuvers and progress to specific defensive driving techniques designed to handle adverse and hazardous conditions. Students will have a working knowledge of New Jersey's driving rules and regulations and an appreciation of the importance of following these guidelines. Students will explore reasons why teen driving is so risky, and will develop and role play action plans that will help to safeguard themselves and their friends in potentially dangerous situations.

drinking and driving. The skills needed for driving are particularly impacted by alcohol and drugs. The state of New Jersey has a zero Tolerance policy for impairment by underage drinkers and strict penalties for the underage consumption of alcohol. A variety of physical skills are necessary when driving, and these can also be impaired if the driver is multitasking when driving. In addition, drivers need to be aware of any deficiencies they personally have in these skills, and develop adaptive measures to counter these deficiencies.
