DV Unit 1 Narrative Writing: Identity

Content Area: English
Course(s): English IV
Time Period: September
Length: 2 months
Status: Published

Unit Overview:

To become ready for college, career, and socially conscious citizenship, students will be introduced to diverse literary perspectives that explore personal identity. Students will also identify their understanding of how race, ethnicity, gender, class, religion and ability characterize writers' experiences in America and make connections to themselves. This unit introduces literary analysis, promotes narrative writing, and supports structured conversations. Students will be exposed to historical contexts for marginalized groups to better understand events that have shaped writers' identity. Students will also be introduced to key terminology and concepts necessary for discourse. Students will ultimately write about their identity and the experiences that have shaped them. The texts in this unit range from memoirs, essays, poems, excerpted fiction novels and short stories as well as speeches, TED Talks, and movies.

Essential Questions:

- 1. How do issues of race, ethnicity, gender, class, religion, and ability influence identity?
- 2. What concepts and terminology help inform an individual's understanding of these issues?
- 3. How can individuals connect their experiences with historical and literary expressions?
- 4. How do cultural traditions and customs help to form an individual's identities?
- 5. How does a defining moment help to mold identity?

Enduring Understandings:

- To think independently and critically about issues of race, ethnicity, nationality, class, religion, ability and literary style within an American context.
- To speak and write reflexively about identity and experience in the United States in a way that acknowledges differences as well as cultural and historical connections.
- To define key terminology and concepts surrounding discourse such as culture, race, ethnicity, gender, religion and class.
