Batik-A fabric technique where selected areas of the cloth are blocked out by brushing or drawing hot wax over them, and the cloth is then dyed.

Analogous Colors-Any one of a group of related colors (typically three to four colors) that are near each other on the color wheel.

Harmony-All parts of the visual image relate to and complement each other.

Motif-an element of an image.
