Enduring Understandings

- The Elements and Principles of Art and Design are the building blocks to creating a work of art.
- The concepts of Color Theory are practical guidelines to color mixing and visual effects.
- Art is a communicative necessity as it releases expression, ideas, creativity, and talent to the viewer, creator, and explorer.
- An understanding of the historical context in which a drawing is created provides a deeper understanding of the interconnected relationship between the artist and his/her political, societal, and cultural environments.
- Style is the *manner* in which the artist portrays his or her subject matter and *how* the artist expresses his or her vision.
- Style is determined by the characteristics that describe the artwork, such as the way the artist employs form, color, and composition.
- An important factor in determining the style of an artwork is to examine the way the artist handles the medium, taking into account the method or technique that the artist uses.

Essential Questions

- How can critiquing artwork as a collection differ from critiquing each work individually?
- Why is cohesion important in an art collection?
- How can one differentiate between artistic choices?
- What does an artist need to consider when selecting a material and a technique to use that material?
- What happens when elements and principles of design are implemented or excluded in an art piece?
- Where do we see evidence of artistic expression in our environment?

- How do critiques present multiple problem solving opportunities?
- How does artistic critical thinking help you problem solve in other disciplines?
- How does an artist choose an idea that is broad enough to allow for substantial inquiry and yet narrow enough to achieve their goals in a given time limit?
- How does artistic style identify a particular artist?
- How do you develop a variety of artworks that are linked together through a common thread?
- How does the artist's choice of medium affect the quality, feeling, and meaning of a drawing or painting?

Content

Students will do the following to create a final artwork with choice materials and techniques:

- Pursue advanced concepts, solving artistic problems, as a result of exposure to and experience with a broad range of media.
- Explore ideas in depth beyond the restrictions of the classroom, engaging in research and advanced planning, decision-making, experimentation and/or risk taking..
- Make choices about theme/concept, media, technique, etc. when creating work with evocative theme that engage the viewer.
- Study and understand the proper use of a variety of media, techniques, and processes.
- Study and apply the Elements of Art and organizational Principles of Design.
- Make compositional choices/decisions, selection, and application of a range of subject matter, symbols, and ideas.
- Study the visual arts in relation to history and cultures.
- Describe, analyze, interpret, and judge their own and the artwork of others.
- Connect the visual arts to other disciplines, daily life, and the world.
- Create original and creative artwork.
- Plan and create artwork/design (real or imaginary) utilizing the Elements of Art and Principles of Design.
- Choose and apply the appropriate Elements of Art and Principles of Design to create a well-balanced and unified composition.
- Engage in observation and use imagination.
- Be able to describe, analyze, interpret, and judge their own and the artwork of others by engaging in oral/written critiques (formal and informal, verbal, written reviews, self-assessments, etc.)
- Problem-solve and plan using preliminary drawings/designs to achieve multiple solutions to visual problems.
- Explore imaginative thinking through creative problem solving.
- Maintain artistic integrity and original ideation.
- Apply knowledge gained throughout the year.
- Build on previous knowledge, refine techniques.
