Key Note

Children's books offer many examples of different kinds of visual art in their illustrations. During read aloud time, always comment on book illustrations, naming the process used to create the illustrations (e.g., watercolor, acrylic or oil paintings, photographs, collage, mixed media, ink drawings, printmaking, sculpture of clay, wood, paper)

Skills

Create patterns through the repetition of elements such as color and shape.

Create art using recycled and natural materials.

Use glue effectively.
