Ford's presidency was hamstrung by Nixon's pardon and a desire to start fresh.

The optimism that came with Carter's election disappeared after a series of economic woes and foreign policy entanglements.

Reagan made Americans feel good about themselves again.

Reagan's deficit spending severely limited the elder Bush presidency and paved the way for the first Boomer president.
