The basic component of all fabrics are fibers

The characteristics of natural and manufactured fiber make certain fibers suitable for certain types of garments

When shopping for clothes, fabric content and what kind of care will be necessary to maintain a certain piece of clothing will be reflected in the price

The proper way to take care of clothes depends on the fiber content of the fabric, the way the fabric was made and any finishes that have been applied to the fabric

Essential Questions

How does knowing the difference between a woven, non-woven, and knit fabric affect the garment's design?

Does knowing if a garment has a finish affect the cost of the garment?

How is the total cost of a garment affected by the maintenance or care of the garment?
