## Transfer Skills

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One can acquire a better understanding of sociopolitical issues when observed through a satirical or ironic lens. Vonnegut is pointing at many of our current problems and future concerns while hinting towards the urgency in which they should be addressed.

## Enduring Understandings

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Authors utilize many genres of fiction, such as science fiction, to bring the concerns of the government to light (i.e. national security, restriction of freedoms, power of police enforcement, etc.).

Many of the challenges towards literature are in the best interest of students and those seeking higher learning, yet some efforts to quell written works are self-serving and aim to keep the population out of the know.

While the government may mean well as it establishes new rules and regulations it is useful to read opposing viewpoints in both non-fiction and satire to establish a better sense of our unity and morale as a country.
