## **Enduring Understandings**

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Many cultures use masks in ancient rituals and religious ceremonies.

Masks allow us to see the basic human issues all of us share, this unique cultural expression yields insight, appreciation, and empathy for the common concerns of the viewer and the mask maker.

Changes in society, technology, and marketing allow artists today to experience and create in new and innovative ways

Replicating ancient artistic processes creates a deeper understanding and empathy for that culture

Artwork reflects the changing societal times and resources which affect the artist's intent and the viewer's responses

## **Essential Questions**

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How is culture and heritage of a society reflected through masks?

What does mask making tell us about the values and beliefs of another culture?

What functional and aesthetic objectives do masks satisfy?

What cross-cultural understandings does the production of masks enable?

What universal human experiences can students involved in mask making understand as a result of this experience?

How can masks provide a tool for students to understand and express issues involved in the concept of global citizenship

## **Content**

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### Vocabulary

Plaster craft, molding, draping, incising, sculptural, iconography, symbolism, embellishment, relief, armature, ceremonial, fertility, deity

## **Skills**

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Contrast a variety of functional and aesthetic decisions faced by a mask maker and the rationale for making his/her design decisions.

Explain how some of the cultural roles and functions addressed by mask production have parallels in our society.

Describe how universal human issues such as death, coming of age, and marriage, can be represented by masks.

Participate in a discussion of mask making options and evaluation for decision making with classmates.

Design and build a mask according to a set of reasons and goals appropriate to this lesson. Make the aesthetic and functional decisions necessary for the design of a thoughtfully conceived mask.

Explore how the design decisions made by the student and the mask maker define the values of a culture and the cultural goals for a mask.

Evaluate the masks made by the student and the class in terms of cross-cultural issues that apply. Participate in a discussion that compares the cultures of the sample masks and our culture.
