## **Enduring Understandings**

Watercolor is an artist medium made with water-soluble binder and thinned with water to create various levels of transparency and opacity.

White watercolor must only be used to create tints of a chosen hue.

Watercolor paintings date back to cave paintings of paleolithic Europe and have been used for manuscript illustration since at least Egyptian times, but especially in the European Middle Ages.

Value infused color is the key to creating 3-dimensional form on a 2-dimensional surface.

How will use color and value to create 3-dimensional realistic forms on a 2-dimensional surface?


How do you know that your painting has the right color and values with correct placement?
