Enduring Understandings

Wheel Throwing is a ancient technique that is very different from handbuilding and has been around since Egyptian time.

Time and practice is the key to becoming an efficient wheel thrower.

Speed kill: slow down when you are pulling the wall up.

Essential Questions

How do I center the clay on the wheel?

What tools are needed to wheel throw?

What is the proper speed and pressure needed to produce an aesthetically pleasing bowl/cylinder?

How dry should the bowl be before I trim the foot on the wheel?

How can I properly clean up after throwing?

Content

Vocabulary: throwing, centering, wedge, foot, trim, spiral wedge, compress

Skills

Throw a bowl or cylinder on the wheel.

Demonstrate how to center the clay on the pottery wheel.

Finish a wheel thrown piece by trimming a foot.

Observe ceramic artist at work and throw on a potter's wheel.

Identify the pattern of motion needed to make a bowl on the wheel.
