Enduring Understandings

Painting is the process by which artists apply color to a surface using a variety of tools and paint media.

The artist selects paint media, tools and surfaces to express the subject, composition, and content of a painted work of art.

A painted artwork both reflects and informs the cultural and historical context in which it is created.

With origins in the Middle Ages and Ancient Graeco-Roman art, still-life painting emerged as a distinct genre and professional specialization in Western painting by the late 16th century, and has remained significant since then.

Still life gives the artist more freedom in the arrangement of elements within a composition than do paintings of other types of subjects such as landscape or portraiture.

Essential Questions

How does basic knowledge of paint media, tools, techniques, and processes provide a foundation for painted artworks?

How has the technology of digital photography affected the development of painting?

Why is it essential to have an understanding of the elements and principles of art in order to create a painted artwork?

What skills do I use inherently as an artist to create?

What experiences do I bring to the creative process?
