Enduring Understandings

Essential Questions

How will you use value to create 3-dimensional forms on a 2-dimensional surface?

How do you know that your painting has the right values?

How will you ensure that your completed painting is finished with fine craftsmanship?

How will you utilize your materials to create desired effects?

How is value created without gradation?

What visual affects can be achieved through different compositional techniques?

How does the application of color theory to a project affect impact?

Learning Objectives

Student development of compositional sketches based on a cropped composition of an original photograph.

Students will apply knowledge of color theory when mixing and blending paints to match the hues displayed

in selected reference photos.

Student analysis of the acrylic painting processes through class demonstration, discussion and critique.

Student creation of a charcoal extreme self-portrait through the use of demonstrated materials and techniques.

Student participation in class critique to identify areas in work that require modification.

Student demonstration of a reasonable amount of time to complete the assignment.

Student demonstrate the ability to care for materials and supplies through learned safety practices.
