What role does polymer and synthetic materials play in the accessibility of creating 3D jewelry?

## Content

create a skinner blend color mixture of clay with a pasta machine

create multiple canes of various design patterns in polymer clay

demonstrate knowledge of materials and processes inherent to the conditioning of different clay bodies

demonstrate proper use of a grommeting tool and set eyelets and grommets as findings in jewelry

make a mold from polymer compound and found object textures

incorporate polymer into jewelry objects

create and revise jewelry pieces using creative problem solving and critical thinking skills to apply personal aesthetics

evaluate and self reflect upon personal artwork as positive artistic growth

take bold design risks and think outside of the box

discover new uses for materials that demonstrate creativity and originality
