Enduring Understandings

Sitting correctly and using proper technique is more comfortable and will help you play better.

Knowing the names of guitar parts, hands, and music notation are important to getting started on the guitar.

Guitarists tune the guitar by ear, or with an electronic tuner.

Guitarists play chords and melodies. Guitarists learn scales in order to facilitate good technique, learn the fretboard and to improvise.

Guitarists read chord diagrams, tablature and staff notation.

Essential Questions

How do we play the guitar properly?

How do we communicate musical idea to others?

Why is learning to read music an important musical skill? Why do musicians play scales?
