Enduring Understandings

Belief in defixiones and other magico-religious practices was widespread in the ancient world for specific reasons (i.e. personal cowardice or helplessness, a lack of confidence in the public system of justice, a lack of scientific understanding of the natural world)

Learning a different language/culture leads to greater understanding of one's own language and culture.

Clarity of thought and ability to reason are drastically improved and developed through in depth exploration of the Latin language.

Retaining the benefits of language study requires regular review and steady exposure.

Essential Questions

How are languages other than English used to communicate?

How does the language I am studying help me to become a more effective reader, writer, speaker and listener in English?

How does the text and interpretation of ancient defixiones reflect the Romans tendency to believe in irrational forces?

How can I become more tolerant of the attitudes and values of others, more accepting of alternative ways of answering life's conflicts?

How are cultural perspectives (attitudes, values and beliefs) reflected in a culture's products and social practices?

Content
