SPANISH 4 HONORS Credits: 5 Prerequisite: Spanish 3 Honors OR Spanish 3 CP with a final average of 91 with teacher recommendation Grades: 11, 12

In this course, students use the language to study the literature, history and culture of Spain and Latin American countries. Emphasis is on free expression and analytical thinking as demonstrated in group discussion and in lengthy written work. Students conduct research and complete problem-based projects in the target language. Students reinforce language skills and develop specific reading, writing and speaking skills necessary for success in advanced placement Spanish language.
