Enduring Understandings

Essential Questions

Learning Objectives

Investigate the use of the elements and principles of art in three-dimensional ceramic work.

Develop an understanding of critique by viewing student examples and master works of art.

Discover the importance of animal objects and animal imagery in different cultures throughout time.

Investigate pinch pot construction in greater depth.

Differentiate ways in which pinch pots may be used in the hand building process.

Distinguish between tools and processes of ceramic hand building.

Plan two-dimensional sketches of projects to further help in understanding how to build those objects.

Reinforce proper glazing procedure, technique, and vocabulary.

Focus on the importance of new techniques when building more sculpturally in clay including weight displacement and allowance for air holes.

Investigate and utilize slab, coil and other advanced building methods.

Anticipate potential problems with the construction of more sculpture objects in clay and create alternate solutions for these problems.
