

# Unit 06: Lee Strasberg

Content Area: **Performing Arts**

## Unit Overview

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In this unit, students will explore the life of Lee Strasberg which included served as stage manager, director, educator, author and developer of The Actors Studio. Students will learn his Method Acting Techniques and be able to apply them to performance pieces in the classroom.

## Application of Knowledge: Students will know that...

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- Lee Strasberg formed the Group Theatre
- Lee Strasberg was a driving force in The Actors Studio
- Lee Strasberg was a top acting teacher of the 20th Century

- Lee Strasberg was influenced by Stanislavsky
- Method Acting was developed by Strasberg which made actors call upon their own emotions and experiences and incorporate them into any performance.
- the secret to Method Acting is creating a reality for themselves and submerging themselves in that reality

## **Application of Skills: Students will be able to...**

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- create reality and apply it to performance pieces
- demonstrate the Method Acting Technique
- identify the major contributions of the Group Theatre
- list the major contributions of Lee Strasberg as a teacher and director as well as an actor
- research and discuss the continued importance of the Actor's Studio session on today's professionals

## **Assessments**

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- written assessment on Lee Strasberg and his contributions to the actor
- demonstration of the Method Acting Technique in a simple scene
- performance of a scene where actors create reality and utilize full Method Acting Techniques
- creation and performance of an original Actor's Studio episode
- information from this unit will be included on a locally developed, end of course benchmark assessment that may take the form of a test, performance based project, or other summative assessment

## **Activities to Differentiate Instruction**

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### **Differentiation for special education:**

- General modifications may include:
  - Modifications & accommodations as listed in the student's IEP
  - Assign a peer to help keep student on task
  - Modified or reduced assignments
  - Reduce length of assignment for different mode of delivery
  - Increase one-to-one time

- Working contract between you and student at risk
- Prioritize tasks
- Think in concrete terms and provide hands-on-tasks
- Position student near helping peer or have quick access to teacher
- Anticipate where needs will be
- Break tests down in smaller increments
- Content specific modifications may include:
  - provide notes for Lee Strasberg assessment
  - work with Theatre Buddy on the Actor's Studio assignment

### **Differentiation for ELL's:**

- General modifications may include:
  - Strategy groups
  - Teacher conferences
  - Graphic organizers
  - Modification plan
  - Collaboration with ELL Teacher
- Content specific vocabulary important for ELL students to understand include: method, reality

### **Differentiation to extend learning for gifted students may include:**

- oral/written report on Lee Strasberg
