

# Unit 1: Greetings

Content Area: **Spanish**  
Course(s): **Spanish**  
Time Period: **Generic Time Period**  
Length: **Weeks**  
Status: **Published**

## Unit Overview

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In this unit, students learn greetings vocabulary and review the appropriate way to greet another person in the Hispanic culture. They will learn to introduce themselves or others in Spanish. They will also be able to answer questions about how they are doing and what language they speak.

## Essential Questions

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How do greetings tell us about a person's culture?

Why is the way someone greets you important?

How can we use this vocabulary in different professions?

## Application of Knowledge and Skills...

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### Students will know that...

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- ¿Cómo está usted? is the formal way of asking how someone is doing
- ¿Cómo estás? is the informal way of asking how someone is doing
- Estoy means I am, and Estás means you are
- Hola is an informal way of saying hello
- Men greet each other with a firm handshake and greet women with a kiss on the cheek
- To ask if someone speaks a particular language, say ¿Hablas...? followed by the name of the language
- To ask someone's name, say ¿Cómo te llamas? (informally) or ¿Cómo es usted? (formally)
- to greet another, say Buenos días, Buenas tardes, or Buenas noches (depending upon the time of day)
- To respond to ¿Cómo estás?, say Estoy bien (good), así, así (so,so) or mal (bad)
- To respond to a question about one's name, say Me llamo (I am called) followed by your name
- To respond to a question about the language one speaks, say Sí, hablo and the name of the language or No, no hablo and the name of the language
- To say goodbye, use adiós, hasta luego, hasta la vista, nos vemos
- tú means "You" informal and usted means "You" formal
- Women of Hispanic culture greet others with a kiss on the cheek

### Students will be able to . . .

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- express and ask how one feels, written and orally
- express and ask what language one speaks, written and orally
- greet each other, written and orally
- identify Spanish girl names and boy names
- introduce themselves and others, written and orally
- recognize and express vocabulary for different languages, written and orally

## Assessments

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- Answer basic greeting questions in Spanish.
- Complete dialog boxes with appropriate conversation, match Spanish vocabulary with the correct translation, and identify if a given question or phrase is informal or formal.
- Diagnostic: Other written assessments
- Formative: Dramatization
- Greetings Skit

- Greetings Test
- Pre-assessment
- Students must greet each other, use introductions, ask two appropriate questions and say goodbye.
- Summative: Written Test
- Work in groups to create a skit in which a person is introduced to the rest of the group.

## Activities

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- create a cartoon in which the characters greet each other
- ask at least five students their name, if they speak a specific language, and how they are doing. Record their data and create a bar graph or pie chart with the results.
- illustrate the people one would address using *tú* and using *usted*
- create a Study Guide for greetings vocabulary

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- create flashcards to review vocabulary
- watch a video to review greetings vocabulary (Moo Series Video)
- participate in Smart Board activities
- review vocabulary using PowerPoint
- play review games on the Internet
