# **Unit 5: Professions**

### **Unit Overview**

In this unit, students learn vocabulary that identifies various professions. They will also learn how to ask and respond to questions about one's profession. They will learn about professions where knowing Spanish would be an asset.

### **Application of Knowledge and Skills...**

#### Students will know that...

- ¿A qué te dedicas? and ¿Cuál es tu profesión? both ask "What is your profession?"
- Me gusta means "I like"
- Te gusta means "you like" or "do you like"
- · There is a masculine and feminine form for each profession
- To ask where someone works, say ¿Dónde trabajas?
- To respond to a question about one's profession, say Soy (I am) followed by the name of the profession
- To respond to a question about where one works, say Trabajo followed by the location

#### Students will be able to . . .

- · ask and respond to questions about professions, written and orally
- describe likes and dislikes
- · name various professions where knowing Spanish would be considered useful
- · recognize and express professions vocabulary, written and orally

#### **Assessments**

- Diagnostic: Other visual assessments
- Formative: Personal Project
- Identify the profession of the people projected on the Smart Board and respond to questions about various professions.
- illustrate the profession of one's choice when grown and write sentences explaining what they like about this profession using Me gusta. They will present to the class.
- label professions using a word bank; answer questions about professions.
