Unit Overview

This unit introduces interpersonal violence as a common problem in society. Students will study common terms associated with the problem and will explore the various factors that contribute to violence or nonviolence. Ultimately, this unit allows students to reflect on the risk and protective factors present in their own lives and how their behavior is a personal choice toward or against violence.

Essential Questions

- What constitutes an act of violence?
- How can I prevent violence from taking place in my life?
- What are factors that lead to violence in my life?
- What are the factors that lead to peace in my life?
- What is the difference between interpersonal conflict and interpersonal violence?

Application of Knowledge and Skills...

- that most often it is an acquaintance that commits an act of violence

Students will be skilled at...

- define key terms in the study of interpersonal violence: violence, lethal, aggravated assault, victim, acquaintance
- · distinguish among factors that lead toward violence and factors that cause peace in an individual's life
- distinguish between interpersonal conflict and interpersonal violence
- list consequences of acts of violence upon another

Assessments

- Classroom discussions on evidence of violence on television and within surrounding communities

Activities to Differentiate Instruction

- Challenge students to identify alternative non-violent solutions to events recorded in television log
- Provide for an acceptable range of appropriate responses to homework log

Students will be using social studies content when analyzing their community for examples of violence and developing methods that lead to peace.
