

Unit 3: Social Problem Solving

Unit Overview

Students will understand that conflicts can be resolved in a peaceful manner by using a problem solving strategy. In this unit students will learn the importance of perspective taking, identifying the problem, and choosing a solution that is agreeable to both parties involved. As the third and final unit in the grade 7 social skills curriculum, the ultimate goal is for students to recognize that there are positive ways to handle conflict; and these strategies, if practiced daily, can benefit them in professional and personal relationships over the course of a lifetime.

Essential Questions

- What is a problem solving strategy?
- Why is it important to put a problem into words?
- How do I consider the other person's point of view?
- Why is it necessary to consider multiple solutions to a problem?

Application of Knowledge: Students will know...

- brainstorming involves generating multiple solutions to a problem
- choosing a solution involves comparing solutions and selecting the best one
- evaluating solutions involves identifying possible consequences of alternative solutions
- identifying a problem involves stating what happened and the points of view of those involved

Application of Skills: Students will be able to...

- choose a solution from several alternatives
- evaluate solutions on the basis of safety, effect on those involved, fairness, and feasibility
- generate multiple solutions to a given problem scenario
- identify a problem within a given situation by saying what happened and the points of view of those involved
