

# Piano Skills

Content Area: **Music**

## Unit Overview

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The purpose of this unit is to give students a basic understanding of one of the most fundamental musical instruments, the keyboard. This is a half year unit intended to start during the 2nd half of the school year. This will be the pre-cursor to a full-year Grade 3 unit that further develops basic keyboarding skills. Keyboarding skills are a fundamental part of developing overall musicianship as they help to build skills in musical literacy, understanding note relationships, and performance.

## Standards

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VPA.1.3.2.B.1	Clap, sing, or play on pitch from basic notation in the treble clef, with consideration of pitch, rhythm, dynamics, and tempo.

## Essential Questions

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- How does learning the keyboard help us with other parts of music?

## Application of Knowledge: Students will know that...

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- keyboards lay out each of the notes of the staff in order from left to right.
- middle C is the central note of the keyboard and is where students will begin learning the layout of the keyboard.
- their fingers are labeled 1-5 to help identify which fingers are used in a piece of music.

## Application of Skills: Students will be able to...

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- name and locate middle C, as well as, each of their fingers.
- play basic 5 finger patterns starting on middle C.
- play simple right hand melodies with accurate notes and rhythms.
- sit with proper playing posture.

## **Assessments**

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- Successfully locating Middle C and identifying their fingerings.
- Ability to play a simple melody using the right-hand.

## **Suggested Activities**

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- Have students label notes of the keyboard on a separate sheet or diagram to have them better understand the note layout.
- Use 5 finger exercises starting on Middle C to develop muscle memory and common patterns.

## **Activities to Differentiate Instruction**

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- For students that excel, give additional exercises using black keys or in some cases the left hand as well.
- For students struggling, give ample time, slower tempos, and individual instruction (when possible).
