Essential Questions

1. Why is it important for raku potters or ceramic artists to understand the firing process of raku clay, and how does this understanding enable them to create visually aesthetic pieces?
2. What are the essential steps involved in creating a raku piece, including working with raku clay, glaze application, and bisque firing?
3. What critical considerations must be taken into account before choosing a finishing technique for a raku piece?
