5. Ceramic art both reflects and informs the culture that creates it and promotes aesthetic interpretations.

Essential Questions

1. Why is it important for artists to understand the elements of art and principles of design?
2. How are the fiber arts considered both art and craft?
3. How does art reflect as well as shape culture?

4. How do textiles impact our everyday lives?
5. How did the discovery of clay as a material to form various objects impact daily life and culture?

Knowledge & Skills

The Elements of Art & Principles of Design students will be able to:

- Identify the elements of art to be: line, shape, form, value, color, space & texture.
- Identify the principles of design to be: balance, unity, contrast, emphasis, pattern, movement & rhythm.
- Recognize the elements & principles in examples of art and apply them to their artwork.

Basketry students will be able to:

- Identify basketry as one of the most ancient and widespread forms of fiber art.
- Identify the four main basket making techniques.
- Identify with the importance of recycling and its impact on the environment.
- Design and create thumbnail sketches for the basket.
- Create a newspaper or magazine recycled basket project.
- Develop coiling or weaving skills.

Weaving students will be able to:

- Discuss the importance of weaving and its origins.
- Create a woven sampler of various weaves.
- Create an original/ethnic woven design.
- Prepare weaved design on graph paper using colored pencils.
- Execute four different weaving techniques.

Fiber Arts students will be able to:

- Identify hand sewing as one of the oldest and most basic forms of fiber art.
- Understand vocabulary about sewing.
- Develop hand sewing skills including various stitches.
- Examine various fibers and fabrics.
- Develop an understanding of the origin of tie-dye as a fabric decoration.
- Identify various resist techniques.
- Evaluate the physiological impact of color.

Modeling students will be able to:

- Develop an understanding of the nature of air-dry clay.
- Develop an understanding of the significance of clay throughout human history: including spiritual, decorative and entertainment uses.
- Model with clay using learned techniques.
- Develop the skills needed to handle and form in clay.
- Experiment with various clay processes and techniques.
