Enduring Understandings

1. In multicellular organisms individual cells grow and then divide via a process called mitosis, thereby allowing the organism to grow. The organism begins as a single cell (fertilized egg) that divides successively to produce many cells, with each parent cell passing identical genetic material (two variants of each chromosome pair) to both daughter cells.
2. As successive subdivisions of an embryo's cells occur, programmed genetic instructions and small differences in their immediate environments activate or inactivate different genes, which cause the cells to develop differently—a process called differentiation.
3. All cells contain genetic information in the form of DNA molecules. Genes are regions in the DNA that contain the instructions that code for the formation of proteins, which carry out most of the work of cells.
4. In all organisms the genetic instructions for forming species' characteristics are carried in the

chromosomes. Each chromosome consists of a single very long DNA molecule, and each gene on the chromosome is a particular segment of that DNA.

5. The instructions for forming species' characteristics are carried in DNA. All cells in an organism have the same genetic content, but the genes used (expressed) by the cell may be regulated in different ways. Not all DNA codes for a protein; some segments of DNA are involved in regulatory or structural functions, and some have no as-yet known function.
6. The information passed from parents to offspring is coded in the DNA molecules that form the chromosomes. In sexual reproduction, chromosomes can sometimes swap sections during the process of meiosis (cell division), thereby creating new genetic combinations and thus more genetic variation.
7. Although DNA replication is tightly regulated and remarkably accurate, errors do occur and result in mutations, which are also a source of genetic variation. Environmental factors can also cause mutations in genes, and viable mutations are inherited. Environmental factors also affect expression of traits, and hence affect the probability of occurrences of traits in a population. Thus the variation and distribution of traits observed depend on both genetic and environmental factors.

Essential Questions

1. How do multicellular organisms which begin as one, single cell, multiply into multicellular organisms made of trillions of specialized cells?
2. How does the body repair when cell tissue is damaged?
3. How are characteristics of one generation passed to the next?
4. How can individuals of the same species and even siblings have different characteristics?
5. How does the cellular process of asexual reproduction compare to the cellular process of making gametes for sexual reproduction?
6. How is genetic variation introduced in sexual reproduction?
7. How are the characteristics of one generation related to the previous generation?
8. Why do individuals of the same species vary in how they look, function, and behave?
9. How is the information present in a gene interpreted to produce a protein?
10. How can an alteration of the DNA nucleotide sequence affect the protein produced?
11. How has our understanding of genetics changed through time?
12. What ethical issues are raised related to biotechnology?

Knowledge and Skills

Knowledge:

1. Students will know that in multicellular organisms individual cells grow and then divide via a process called mitosis, thereby allowing the organism to grow. The organism begins as a single cell (fertilized egg) that divides successively to produce many cells, with each parent cell passing identical genetic material (two variants of each chromosome pair) to both daughter cells. Cellular division and differentiation produce and maintain a complex organism, composed of systems of tissues and organs that work together to meet the needs of the whole organism. (DCI LS1.B Growth and Development of Organisms).
2. Students will know that systems of specialized cells within organisms help them perform the essential functions of life. (DCI LS1.A Structure and Function)
3. Students will know that all cells contain genetic information in the form of DNA molecules. Genes are regions in the DNA that contain the instructions that code for the formation of proteins, which carry out most of the work of cells. (DCI LS1.A Structure and Function)
4. Students will know that each chromosome consists of a single very long DNA molecule, and each gene on the chromosome is a particular segment of that DNA. The instructions for forming species' characteristics are carried in DNA. All cells in an organism have the same genetic content, but the genes used (expressed) by the cell may be regulated in different ways.
