Essential Questions

1. What elements should the audience pay attention to in a film?
2. How does pacing (e.g., editing, silence, music, acting) influence the message of a project?
3. What distinguishes one film from another?
4. How can compositions affect the storytelling of the environment, characters, time period, etc.?

Knowledge and Skills

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Students will be able to:

- Understand how various cinematic elements and techniques are used to create a style or genre of film, and how it contrasts from other genres in terms of pacing, tempo, suspense, and point of view. • Identify how symbols and motifs can create deeper meaning in storytelling.
- Basics of Adobe Premiere Pro software.
- How to properly upload and save a project.
- How to create voice overs for final edit.
- Understand the level of planning, detail, and creativity that goes into the production of a film.
- Articulate how filmmaking components support a character's journey and/or development.
- Differentiate styles of acting (i.e. theater acting, Method acting, realism)
- Compare and contrast different directing and cinematography techniques.
- Investigate how editing, cuts, and shot length can affect the overall tone and story.
- Study how music and sound effects add to tone and emotion.
- Use knowledge from Premiere Pro fundamentals to create original short films and music videos.
