## Enduring Understandings

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1. Beads, metal, and wire serve as expressive mediums for creating jewelry, taking on diverse forms and meanings influenced by material, society, culture, time, and place.
2. Jewelry is inherently symbolic, its meaning deeply tied to its material and the societal, cultural, and historical context of its creation and wear, continually evolving with technological advancements.
3. Critiques are essential for a deeper understanding of an artist's intent and the messages conveyed through their work.

## **Essential Questions**

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1. How do diverse cultures across time utilize materials like string, beads, metal, and wire to express ideas and signify status through jewelry and ornamentation?
2. How do material choices, technological advancements, tools, skills, and techniques fundamentally shape the creation and forms of jewelry?
3. How does understanding the cultural and societal context of jewelry, along with its presentation, influence its critique and public reception?

## **Knowledge and Skills**

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Students will be able to:

- Apply the Elements of Art and Principles of Design to the discussion and critique of exemplary jewelry pieces.
- Examine the global importance of fine craftsmanship.
- Understand the different symbolism of beads, materials, and jewelry pieces in different cultures and societies.
- Learn about the important jewelry/ornamentation and materials of different cultures.
- Articulate how changes in technology influence the creation and advancement of art.

## **Transfer Goals**

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1. Students will independently critique works of art, finding meaning based on historical time periods, societal, and cultural influences to better understand the artist's intent.
2. Students will compile a cohesive portfolio that documents their individual creative growth and deepened understanding of jewelry-making processes.

## **Resources & Materials**

- Visuals: Photos of exemplary jewelry pieces by prominent artists across cultures and time periods
- Samples: Physical jewelry pieces crafted by instructors and students
