2. Synthesize how views from the Left and Right, either radical and moderate, influence or respond to the progression of equality and freedom in America and the world?
3. Evaluate the impact has technology and Industry had on political, social and military history in America?
4. Compare the pros and cons of US interventionist foreign policies during the period from 1898-present and how has that policy affected views of American society both domestically and abroad?
5. Decipher the role the executive, legislative, and judiciary branch played in shaping and reacting to societal and political changes in the United States?
 - Students will determine, through media literacy skills and lateral, close reading strategies when evaluating primary and secondary resources the following: 1. context of the text; 2. reason for the text; 3. type of source the text is; 4. the point of view of the author of the text 5. the intended audience for the text 6. evaluate the stance of the text
 - Students will use Historical Thinking Skills to evaluate sources and ideas. Comparison, Contextualization, Continuity and Change over Time, Periodization, Synthesis, Claims, Point of View, Intended Audience, and Purpose.
 - Students will observe, note, and draw conclusions with the understanding that there are multiple perspectives. Multiple perspectives is the foundation to understanding the why and how of history.

Documents, primary sources, historical readings will be evaluated.
