## Enduring Understandings

Students will understand the following:

The Great Chain of Being and the concept of fate v. free will directly impacted artists and writers of the sixteenth century.

Emotions can prompt poor decision making and behavior resulting in tragic consequences.

The presence of high emotion, a tragic hero who embodies a tragic flaw, and a catastrophic ending are the main tenets of a tragedy.

Shakespeare's use of iambic pentameter, blank verse, inverted syntax, and sound devices help to create a

lyrical and poetic quality in his works.

# **Essential Questions**

How are plays of the Renaissance a commentary on life and morality in the period?

How can emotion be more powerful than reason?

What is a tragedy?

How does an author's language enhance meaning and create effect?

# **Knowledge and Skills**

Students will begin their study of Shakespeare, his life and times, and the play Romeo and Juliet.

Students will learn and understand the nature of the theater during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries.

Students will learn the nuances of Shakespearean drama and learn the following terms: tragedy, comedy, history, pun, allusion, soliloquy, monologue, assonance, scansion, iambic pentameter, dramatic irony, situational irony, verbal irony, aside, and blank verse. Students will explore the use of irony (dramatic, situational, verbal) in *Romeo and Juliet*.

Students will focus on the beauty of Shakespeare's language and his ability to write in iambic pentameter. Students will continue their exploration of English grammar by understanding clauses in sentences. Students will listen to actors acting out scenes of Romeo and Juliet to understand the plot and to appreciate the use of rhythm and meter.

Students will be able to identify different types of sonnets and explain the meaning and type of sonnet by recognizing structure and rhyme pattern.

## **Transfer Goals**

Students will independently be able to scan and recognize the structure of a sonnet and trace the development of thought in a sonnet.

Students will independently be able to apply several important themes such as fate vs. free will, youth vs. old age, and good v. evil to their own lives, so they can understand events and make correct decisions in their own lives.
