Enduring Understandings

1. Human culture is influenced, but not controlled by geography.
2. Cultural practices vary across geographical locations because of physical geography and available resources.
3. The interaction of people contributes to the spread of cultural practices.
4. Cultural ideas, practices, and innovations change or disappear over time

5. Although the concept of "race" has important societal implications, there is no scientific basis for dividing humanity into racial groups.
- Students will determine, through media literacy skills and lateral, close reading strategies when evaluating primary and secondary resources the following: 1. context of the text; 2. reason for the text; 3. type of source the text is; 4. the point of view of the author of the text 5. the intended audience for the text 6. evaluate the stance of the text
 - Students will use Historical Thinking Skills to evaluate sources and ideas. Comparison, Contextualization, Continuity and Change over Time, Periodization, Synthesis, Claims, Point of View, Intended Audience, and Purpose.
 - Students will observe, note, and draw conclusions with the understanding that there are multiple perspectives. Multiple perspectives is the foundation to understanding the why and how of history. Documents, primary sources, historical readings will be evaluated.

Essential Questions

1. How does where people live and what resources they have access to impact their cultural practices?
2. How and why do cultural ideas, practices, and innovations change or disappear over time?
3. How does the interaction of people contribute to the spread of cultural practices?

 - Colonialism, imperialism, and trade helped to shape patterns and practices of culture.
 - cultural convergence and divergence
7. Explain what factors lead to the diffusion of universalizing and ethnic religions.
 - Language families (Indo-European), languages, dialects, world religions, ethnic cultures, and gender roles diffuse from cultural hearths.

- Universalizing religions, including Christianity, Islam, Buddhism, and Sikhism, are spread through expansion and relocation diffusion.
 - Ethnic religions, including Hinduism and Judaism, are generally found near the hearth or spread through relocation diffusion.
