Students will be able to:

- Recall, define, recognize and utilize the elements of art from Fine Art 1.
- Recall, define, recognize and utilize the principles of design from Fine Art 2.
- Review, practice and apply art-making techniques and skills developed in Fine Art 1 & 2.
- Continue creating original works of art based on traditional draftsman skills and composition as the main focus of the works.
- Continue creating works that demonstrate intentional incorporations of concept and ideas that drive form and composition.
- Explore different techniques, concepts and subject matter in their works.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the concepts and principles of perspective, foreshortening, scale, and figure/ground relationships in their work.
- Demonstrate an understanding of layering, opacity vs. transparency, and juxtaposition in their work.
- Continue to observe, discuss and study the works of other artists through field trip or online research.
- Focus on 1 of their 5 chosen inspirational artists they would like to continue researching.
- Answer the 10 questions to guide their research on their chosen artists.
- Present on chosen artist, and plan for original work starting from 3 main concepts.
- Continue developing the breadth & concentration sections of their portfolio.
- Regularly participate in written and/or verbal critique of student artwork.
- Recognize the importance of having a well-developed portfolio, which showcases different technical skills, understanding of the elements of art and principles of design, and unique concepts.
