- 1. Students will understand that effective theatrical production is an intricate and collaborative process, where each role's contribution is vital to shaping the final performance.
- 2. Students will understand that dynamic rehearsal techniques and planning are essential for transforming dramatic text into a fully realized and active stage performance.
- 3. Students will understand the importance of ensemble team building and the stage manager's

comprehensive role in unifying the production team towards a shared artistic vision.

Essential Questions

- 1. How do directors, actors, and stage managers effectively prepare for and execute rehearsals to transform a dramatic script into dynamic, realized stage action?
- 2. What collaborative strategies and creative choices, including the use of performance space and composition, build a strong ensemble and serve the playwright's vision and the overall storytelling?
- 3. How do actors develop richly three-dimensional characters through their own preparation and intentional exploration of movement and vocal choices, guided by the director?

Knowledge and Skills

Students will be able to...

- Experience a full production rehearsal process from first read-thru to technical rehearsals.
- Propose different ideas and suggestions.
- Develop strategies to collaborate with various production crew members.
- Create dynamic stage pictures/compositions through exercises and theater games.
- Create characters through improvisations and acting exercises.
- Execute and edit a rehearsal plan process.
- Organize and mark a script for beats, intentions, and blocking.
- Memorize and understand the structure of a particular script.
- Step into different production roles to get a well-rounded understanding of what it means to put on a play.

Transfer Goals

- 1. Students will be able to adapt and apply effective rehearsal techniques and collaborative communication strategies to cultivate dynamic performances, solve unexpected challenges, and support actors and crew members toward a cohesive artistic vision in any theatrical setting.
- 2. Students will demonstrate the ability to analyze and utilize performance space as an integral storytelling element, transcending literal interpretation to enhance dramatic impact.

Assessment

Assessments

Formative:

- 1. Exit Tickets (e.g., "One thing I learned about adapting on stage today," "My biggest challenge in tech rehearsal")
- 2. Do-Nows/Warm-ups (e.g., improvisational exercises, vocal/physical warm-ups)
- 3. Strategic Questioning (during tech rehearsals and final run-throughs)
- 4. Guided Discussions (post-performance reflections, technical issues debriefs)
- 5. Think Pair Share (e.g., "How did our choices impact the audience?")
- 6. Participation (engagement in rehearsals, technical setup, and performance)
- 7. Critiques (peer feedback during dress rehearsals)

Alternative:

1. Creative projects/performances - application of skillsets (the final performance itself)

Summative:

- 1. Performance Tasks with Rubrics:
- 2. Final One-Act Play Performance: Assessed on directorial vision, acting, technical execution, and overall storytelling impact. Rubrics will evaluate aspects like character development, stage composition, vocal projection, adherence to script, and technical cues.

- 3. Director's Post-Performance Reflection Paper/Presentation: Students analyze the performance, discussing successes, challenges, and lessons learned from the entire production process.
- 4. Production Journal/Portfolio: A cumulative record of their work throughout all three units, showcasing script analysis, rehearsal plans, blocking, design elements, and personal reflections
