Unit Summary

Students will learn how historical figures and places are related. They will study great leaders such as MLK Jr., presidents, civil rights activists and inventors. They will build on their understanding of national symbols by learning how different monuments and memorials are erected in honor of great leaders in our society. We will explore the foundation of rights and responsibilities in our society.
