Unit Summary

This unit looks at the growing differences between the North and South before the Civil War, including the areas of industry, agriculture, society (people). The lives of the enslaved is studied in depth with lessons about African American culture, conditions and treatment of enslaved people, and forms of resistance against slavery. To conclude the unit, students will research an example of modern day slavery using library databases and resources.

Student Learning Objectives

- Students will learn the causes and consequences of the 19th century transportation revolution.
- Students will learn the impact of technological advancements on the agricultural economy and slave labor.
- Students will learn the various immigrant groups that came to the U.S. during the early 1800s and their contributions.
- Students will learn the reasons various urban centers developed during the 1800s.
- Students will learn the differences between the economies of the North and South.
- Students will learn the influence of individuals on social and political developments in the South.
- Students will learn the role of slavery in the development of sectional conflict.
- Students will learn the culture, treatment, and forms of resistance exhibited by the enslaved.
- Students will learn about an instance of modern day slavery and develop and communicate solutions.

Essential Questions

- How did technology change the way people lived in both the North and the South?
- How did the North and South differ in terms of agriculture, technology, and society (people)?
- What were the experiences of those who were enslaved?
- How did enslaved people resist?
- What is an example of modern day slavery?

Enduring Understandings

- Students will understand that ways of life in the North and South continued to diverge throughout the mid 1800s.
- Students will understand and respect the experiences of and acts of resistance by enslaved people.
- Students will understand that forms of modern day slavery exist globally.

- Design and explain the meaning behind a slave quilt square.
- Listen to and reflect on primary accounts of the lives and experiences of enslaved people.
