Unit Summary

Singing is the primary focus of an elementary music classroom. Students will use their singing voices to explore every concept found throughout their music curriculum. Each lesson will incorporate numerous opportunities for students to use their singing voices without instrumental accompaniment. Students will develop healthy singing habits through age-appropriate vocal explorations and folk song literature. All repertoire will be thoughtfully planned to stay within the appropriate vocal range of the first grade developing voice. Similarly, all repertoire will be sung in a key which encourages use of the headvoice. Student growth will be assessed during engaging activities, such as singing games and call and response greeting patterns. Students will have opportunities to sing song literature from varying cultures, genres, and historical periods, both independently and with others.

Student Learning Objectives

Students will learn ...

- Proper vocal placement/usage of the headvoice
- How to differentiate between vocal timbres (whispering, speaking, calling, singing, etc.)
- How to use appropriate posture, breath, and phrasing while singing
- How to use audiation to strengthen listening and pitch matching skills
- How to perform rhythmic and melodic concepts while singing alone and with others
- How singing conveys expressive qualities and aesthetic responses
- About song literature from various cultures, genres, and historical periods
- How to improvise while singing, such as during call & response activities

Essential Questions

- What does healthy singing sound like?
- What does healthy singing feel like?
- How do I use my posture and breath to produce proper vocal production?
