Unit 6- Short Story

Content Area: English Language Arts

Unit Summary

The short stories in this unit all relate to the concept of "growing up," the theme of this unit. Students must consider what protagonists live through and the kinds of decisions they make that move them forward on their journey to adulthood. Students will read and think deeply about themes by understanding the short story's structure and connecting the concept of growing up to each one. Throughout their analysis, students will gain insight into what causes characters to grow and change while inferring the personality traits of a character. Students will develop a knowledge base that will enable them to read and understand literature on a deeper level.
