Unit Summary

Form can be defined as the overall structure of a musical composition. In Kindergarten, students begin learning this concept by recognizing the number of phrases of a simple folk song and labeling them with pictures and/or shapes. These visual symbols help them discover how phrases of music can be the same or different. For example, if there are four phrases in a song, and only the third phrase is different, students will label the form as same, same, different, same or circle, circle, square, circle. These shapes/pictures will then transition into the traditional labeling of form using letters, such as AABA. At this early stage of learning, repertoire is thoughtfully chosen to ensure the same parts are exactly alike and the different parts are very different.

Student Learning Objectives

Students will learn ...

- how to analyze the overall structure of a piece of music
- how to label sections of a piece of music
- how to identify musical phrases that are same/different

Essential Questions

- Does every song have form?
- Can you determine form by listening?
- What are the different types of form?
