

Sadlier Vocabulary (Reading, Writing, and Language)

Unit Summary

Throughout the year, students work on improving vocabulary while incorporating essential reading skills. This is a year long unit, in which students independently follow a prescribed set of steps. While working through each unit, students will use context clues, analyze their thinking, incorporate terms within their writing, use multiple facets to deepen understandings of topics and build upon their comprehension skills.

Word knowledge is essential to reading comprehension, as is the importance of using context clues to figure out the meaning of unfamiliar words when reading. Each unit passage includes identified vocabulary terms, which exposes students to the vocabulary in the context of authentic literature. Students will also have opportunities to learn about figures of speech, including adages, idioms, and proverbs. The passages represent a variety of fiction and nonfiction genres that students commonly encounter at school and in their non-academic activities. Students read the words in context to activate prior knowledge then draw on context clues to help them determine the meaning of unfamiliar words.

Each unit and level combines print, audio, and visual media to motivate students and enrich their vocabularies. This integrated approach delivers vocabulary instruction in a way that reaches a diversity of learners and helps all students truly “own” words in their growing vocabularies. Each unit takes about two to three weeks to complete. During the first week, students work on building schema and learning how to read and define targeted terms. During the second week, students work on learning the terms through homework and work on their slideshow and begin to work on the essay (when applicable). During the third week, while learning a new set of terms, students will complete the essay.
