Unit 6: Instrument Exploration / Families of the Orchestra

Unit Summary

Students will use age-appropriate instruments during weekly music classes as a tool to further their knowledge of curriculum concepts. Instruments are an engaging way to solidify steady beat, rhythmic notation, melodic notation, improvisation, composing, active listening, etc. Third grade students will learn how to play the recorder and take it home for weekly practice. In addition, our classroom instrument collection includes a wide variety of miscellaneous pitched and non-pitched percussion instruments. We will explore barred Orff instruments, handbells, boomwhackers, a large variety of drums, and our digital piano. Lastly, we will discover instruments utilizing technology tools such as our classroom iPads.
