Unit Summary

Third grade musicians will explore harmony through developmentally-appropriate activities and repertoire such as partner songs and canons.

How does harmony make music more interesting, complex and enjoyable?

Enduring Understandings

- harmony is defined as two or more notes occurring at the same time.
- harmony enhances musical interest, texture and complexity.

Application

Students will be able to independently use their learning to:

- perform harmony in small groups and large ensembles.
- blend complimenting melodics together while matching pitch and dynamics levels through active listening.
- perform I-V accompaniments on Orff instruments while singing simple folk song literature,

Skills

Students will be skilled at:

- layering rhythmic patterns and melodies to create harmony and texture.
- performing 2 and 3 part canons securely in an ensemble setting.
- experiencing harmony by joining to melodies together in a partner song.
- identify harmonic sounds as major or minor.
- performing I-V accompaniments on Orff instruments while singing simple folk song literature.
