

Unit 2: Rhythm

Unit Summary

In this unit, fourth grade students will develop understanding of reading and writing rhythms within given parameters. Students will learn about time signature and how to follow a given time signature. Students will practice reading and performing rhythms on various instruments with regards to a steady beat. Students will compose music within a given parameter and perform on a variety of instruments.
