Unit 6: Historical Fiction

Content Area: English Language Arts

Unit Summary

The study of historical fiction as a genre is important because it exposes our readers to complex, rich texts that explore both worlds of nonfiction and narrative. In this unit, students will work together in book clubs to read historical fiction novels. Students will set goals together and independently run their clubs, drawing upon their toolbox of strategies acquired all year long to explore character, grow theories, ask questions and fuel deep conversation. Students will not just discuss their books but use those conversations to also write about reading and gather evidence to support their opinions and ideas. Students will explore the nonfiction facts; events and concepts of their novels; identify and analyze changes in character based on events; identify the importance of setting; and focus on what elements mostly impact the storyline. To support their understanding of the time period, students will research the WWII era in order to develop a general understanding as well as angle their papers to focus on a more specific aspect of that era.

- Why do characters do what they do and feel how they feel and how does the historical aspect of the novel play a role in this concept?
- How does setting play an important role in historical fiction?
- How can readers support their understanding of a time period when reading historical fiction?

Enduring Understandings

Students will understand that:

- authors of historical fiction study actual events from history to accurately portray the lives and times of the characters in their stories.
- characters of a historical fiction story are affected by the setting, through historical circumstances.
- good readers research the time period they are reading to get a better understanding of what the character is going through.
