Unit Summary

During this unit students will be engaged in developing their comprehension of rhythms. They will review concepts previously taught and build upon those concepts. Students will begin to use counts to label rhythms instead of using "ta and ti-ti language." Students will also be exposed to different rhythmic symbols and more complex time signatures. The information taught during the rhythm unit will be continuously referred to throughout the year as students build upon their knowledge
