- identify jobs done in a factory that result in the manufacturing of a finished good
- identify qualities of leaders
- evaluate the impact of scarcity on trade
- understand that scarcity results in the exchange of goods among countries in the Western Hemisphere
- understand that goods need to be transported from one place to another
- explore basic human needs and wants
- analyze the concept of working to earn money to provide for needs and wants
- analyze the concepts of saving and banks
