- A picture graph uses picture symbols to show the numbers of things.
- Goods are things that are made or grown. A service is when you do things for other people.
- Transportation moves people and things. Transportation makes it possible for goods to be shipped to a store.
- Wants are things we would like to have. Needs are things we must have to live.
- We use coins and paper money to buy things. Paper money is made in Washington, D.C.; it is printed on big sheets of paper with special ink. Coins are made in a places called mints.

Content

Students will be able to:

- Identify a variety of jobs that people perform.
- Describe work performed by family and community members, and how they help one another.
- Distinguish between needs and wants.
- Demonstrate that people have unlimited wants but limited resources to satisfy them.
- Recognize that people must make economic choices among alternatives.
- Identify forms of transportation and learn how transportation helps people.
- Recognize how goods are shipped both within and outside of a country.
- Classify objects by sorting them into groups.
- Learn a procedure for sorting things into groups.
- Recognize that money comes in different amounts.
- Identify value of coins and bills.
- Understand how money is made.
- Recognize that every country has its own money.
- Understand that different countries have different kinds of money.
- Identify names of currencies used in different countries.
- Read a picture graph.
- Analyze information from a picture graph.
