- Columbus Day or Martin Luther King, Jr. Day are two holidays in which we remember a person.
- In the United States, children roll eggs on the White House lawn. In China, they clean the house, plant

trees, and flowers, and remember their families. In England, they dance around the Maypole.

- It is the date on which the United States said it was free from England.
- Special days that families celebrate are a day a baby is born, graduations, weddings, and family reunions.
- Symbols remind us of our country. Some symbols stand for hope, freedom, and friendship. Some symbols are the Liberty Bell and the Statue of Liberty.
- We remember important people or something special that happened.

Content

Student will be able to:

- Recognize that holidays are special days.
- Identify George Washington and Abraham Lincoln as important U.S. Presidents.
- Understand why Presidents' Day is celebrated.
- Understand why people celebrate holidays.
- Identify Independence Day, Columbus Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Martin Luther King Day as holidays.
- Understand that when we make predictions, we tell what we think will happen in the future.
- Learn a procedure for making a prediction.
- Recognize that families have special days that they celebrate.
- Recognize that different families celebrate different days.
- Identify some of the special days that families celebrate.
- Understand that spring is a season that people celebrate around the world.
- Learn how spring (and holidays:Christmas) is celebrated differently around the world.
- Understand why symbols that represent the United States are important.
