Content

Students will be able to:

- identify parts of a poem and answer questions about poems.
- compare and contrast ideas in a poem and make connections to their own personal experiences and points of view
- identify main idea, author's purpose, mood, and theme of a poem
- identify verse and meter in poems
- identify regular beats, rhymes, stanzas, lines and repetition in poetry
- compare and contrast poems by the same author or on the same topic
- answer questions about explicit and implicit information in a text
