Essential Questions

- How do communities change over time?
- Why did the first European settlers come to America and where did they settle?
- Why did the Separatists immigrate to the New World and how did the Wampanoag Native Americans help them survive?

Enduring Understanding

- Communities change over time in several ways. Many communities grow larger. Some add new businesses and industries. Others have immigrants from other countries come to them. Communities grow as new settlers arrive to find a better life. As people move in new cultures and ways of doing things change.
- The first settlers came from Europe in order to build a colony and get rich from the lands' natural resources. They settled in Jamestown; land that was inhabited by the Powhatan Native Americans. Like the Native Americans, the Jamestown settlers had to survive using the resources around them.
- The Separatists immigrated from Europe to the New World in search of religious freedom. Their journey was hard and they faced many challenges their first year in Plymouth. With the help of the Wampanoag Native Americans and Squanto, the Separatists learned how to survive using the resources around them.

Content

The students will be able to:

- Identify Native Americans as the first inhabitants of North America
- Understand how natural resources shaped Native Americans communities
- Describe the geography of Jamestown
- Identify the changes caused by European settlement at Jamestown
- Examine how the Powhatan and the English were affected by their environment
- Understand what a colony is
- Investigate colonial life in Jamestown
- Learn about the original 13 colonies that became our first states
- Explain why the Separatists came to the New World
- Describe the hardships the Separatists faced on their journey to the New World
- Describe the hardships the Separatists faced their first year in Plymouth

- Explain who Squanto some of the important events in his life.
- Explain how Squanto and the Wampanoag Native Americans helped the Pilgrims
